

Before You Copy

Check these Fair Dealing Copying Guidelines

The Copyright Act allows you to copy sections of copyrighted books, articles and other material without the consent of the copyright owner as long as you copying fairly for **research, private study, criticism, review or news reporting**. This is called *Fair Dealing*.

Use the following guidelines when copying for the purpose of research or private study.

You may copy up to:

10% of a published work other than a textbook produced for the post secondary education market

or the following, whichever is greater:

- An entire chapter from a book provided that it does not exceed 20 percent of the book.
- An entire article from a periodical publication. A periodical publication can be defined as any work that is published in regular intervals. Common examples of periodical publications are newspapers, magazines and academic journals.
- An entire short story, play or poem from a periodical publication.
- An entire entry from an encyclopedia, dictionary, annotated bibliography or similar reference book.
- An entire reproduction of an artistic work from a book or periodical publication.
- A single musical score from a book or period publication.

You may copy up to:

5% of a textbook produced for the post secondary education market

or the following, whichever is greater:

- An entire chapter from a textbook provided that it does not exceed 10 percent of the textbook.
- An entire short story, play, poem or essay from a textbook provided that it does not exceed 10 percent of the textbook.
- An entire reproduction of an artistic work or a single musical score from a textbook provided that it does not exceed 10 percent of the textbook.

You may not copy the following:

- Any of the following where the publication containing the work does not contain other works: articles, short stories, plays, poems, artistic works (including reproductions), and musical scores. For example, no copy may be made of a play from a publication containing the play but no other work.
- Unpublished works.
- Proprietary workbooks, work cards, assignment sheets, tests, examination papers and instruction manuals.
- Newsletters with restricted circulation intended to be restricted to a fee paying clientele; or business cases which are made available for purchase.

In certain circumstances, copies that exceed these guidelines may still fall under fair dealing. Contact the Copyright Advisory Office at 613-533-6000 ext. 78510 or at copy.right@queensu.ca for more information.
