Books

Search for books using either Summon or QCAT.

Finding Articles: Indexes and Databases

Search indexes and databases to find articles on your topic in scholarly journals, popular magazines and newspapers.

Databases are accessible from the library homepage and from library subject guides:

From the library homepage, choose the **Databases tab** when you know the name of the database you wish to search. To view all databases associated with a particular discipline, choose **Browse Databases by Subject**.

Multidisciplinary Databases:

Searches across most, but not all, of the library’s electronic resources (catalogue, article indexes, databases, electronic book and journal collections); each citation includes a link to either the online version of the item or a link to a record that indicates where a paper (or microfilm) version is located within Queen’s Library.

What is RefWorks?

RefWorks is a web-based research management tool that allows you to:

- **organize** your research by creating folders for classes and assignments;
- **format bibliographies automatically** in any of the major bibliographic styles (eg. APA, MLA, etc.).
- **import citations** from database and library catalogue searches;
- **share your research** with others (using RefShare);
- **integrate** with MS Word (via the Write-n-Cite plug-in).

RefWorks is available to all Queen's students, staff and faculty.

How do I create a RefWorks account?

- Connect via the RefWorks link on the Queen's Library home page. (Note: if you are off-campus, you will first be asked to enter your NetID)
- Click on **New to RefWorks? Sign up for an Individual Account** and follow the prompts.
 - You will receive a confirmation email with your new RefWorks Login Name and Password.

How do I connect to my RefWorks account?

- Use the RefWorks link on the Queen's Library website to access your account, from anywhere in the world.
 - Log in with the Login Name and Password you created when you registered.

How do I add citations to RefWorks?

There are several ways to add data to your RefWorks database:

1. Export citations from indexes and databases.
2. Import text files, where no direct export option is available from within the database.
3. Add citations manually.

4. Import from a library catalogue.
5. Use RefGrab-It to capture bibliographic information from web pages.
6. Convert data from other bibliographic management tools such as EndNote.
7. Import from RSS Feeds.

Direct Export from Databases

When you find articles or other references in your database or catalogue searches which you want to save to RefWorks, you “mark” them and then “save” them into your own RefWorks account.

The mark/save process varies depending on the article database or library catalogue you are working in.

EBSCOHost Databases and RefWorks

How to download citations into RefWorks from Databases on EBSCOHost

EBSCOHost provides a “Direct Export” function into RefWorks:

1. Connect to the desired [EBSCOHost database](#), perform a search and view the results list.
2. Mark one or more records [“Add to Folder”].
3. Click **Go to: Folder View** (right side of screen).
4. Select the desired records.
5. Click on the **Export** icon.
6. Select: **Direct Export to RefWorks**.
7. Click **Save** [your browser must allow pop-ups].
8. In RefWorks, your records should appear in **Last Imported Folder**.

- Using **PubMed** find articles on *homeostasis, exercise and diabetes*.
- Export two articles into RefWorks.

PubMed

1. Conduct your search.
2. Mark the records you wish to export.
3. Click on the Display Settings link and select Medline and click the Apply button.
4. Your results will be displayed in a tagged format. Using your browser's Save As function, navigate to the local drive and directory where you want to save the file and save the file in the text (.txt) format.
5. Log in to RefWorks.
6. Select References/Import from the toolbar.
7. Select NLM PubMed as the data source and as the database.
8. Browse to find the text file you saved to your computer (if you opened the file, copy and paste the text into the Importing Data from the Following Text area).
9. Click Import.
10. Your records should appear in the Last Imported Folder.

Importing Citations from the Library Catalogue

- Search **Summon** to find a book on *homeostasis, exercise and diabetes*.
 - Save to folder.
 - Export result to RefWorks.
- Perform the same search in **QCAT**.
 - Select a book.
 - Click on Export.
 - Choose Option 1: Export Directly to RefWorks [Export to RefWorks](#)

Exporting references from Google Scholar

- To export to RefWorks from within Google Scholar:
 - visit Scholar Preferences page.
 - under **Bibliography Manager**, select the option to **show links to import citations** and choose **RefWorks**.
 - click **Save Preferences**.

Creating Folders

- Folders organize your citations.
- Create a folder called *Diabetes*.
 - Create another folder on a topic of your choice.
- There is no limit to the number of folders you can create.

Generating a Bibliography

- Choose output style.
- Select what file type to create.
- Select to format all of your references or only those from a specific folder.

RefWorks Tools and Add-ons

Several add-ons, to facilitate personal and group research, are available in RefWorks:

- **RefShare** - allows you to share your RefWorks database(s) or specific RefWorks folders with other RefWorks account-holders.
- **Write-n-Cite** - a plug-in (PC and Mac) that allows you to use RefWorks with MS Word. It works with your word-processor to create citations while you are writing your paper.
- **RefGrab-It** - works with your browser to capture bibliographic information from web pages. Note: RefGrab-It cannot be used on .pdf files from web sites.
